Although Matt didn't participate in the regular audition, he did, however, send in a headshot. To his surprise, he was later e-mailed and told that he was cast as an extra in a courtroom scene and picked randomly by the director to play the part of Juror #5.

The movie, titled "The Substitution," tells the story of a substitute teacher that possibly had questionable relations with a student. It will air the middle of March for viewing on Amazon and Netflix.

"The director, Bob Byington, is originally from Lincoln, Nebraska, and wanted to film a movie in Nebraska that had a

Wednesday morning, September 23, at the Lincoln County District Courthouse. He was given three lines to speak, playing Juror #5.

In addition to the director, Matt met actors Keith Poulson (playing the role of the husband) and Jack Marshall (playing the lead detective role).

"The whole process of how a movie is made - sounds, takes, how the director and producer see things - made me realize how little we see of the big picture of what goes into televi-

sion entertainment," said Matt. Although a lot of scenes are cut and edited in a movie, Matt said he was told by the director that his scene will definitely make it in.

"I guess we will see when it comes out. I won't hold my breath!" he said.

Sixth Grade Project Helps Hurricane Victims

When a hurricane hits Texas - affecting thousands - how can you reach out and help from the state of Nebraska?

Sixth grader Madison Smith wanted to help the victims of Hurricane Harvey and came up with a community project that

turned out to be very successful.

Madison and her mom, Tami, first contacted the Orphan Grain Train out of Norfolk, a 501c3 nonprofit Christian volunteer network that shares personal and material resources

with needy people in America and around the world. The organization had already sent semi-loads of supplies to Texas, but another shipment was scheduled to leave Norfolk very soon.

Madison presented the idea of

organizing a donation drive to her classmates, and with only a one-week timeline left before supplies left Nebraska for Texas, her classmates were on board.

Colorful posters were made and hung around town and a Facebook page was created for everyone to share. An enclosed trailer was placed at Winsome Inn & Suites, and the response was overwhelming.

In a matter of days, the trailer was completely filled with a variety of needed supplies...hygiene items, socks and underwear, blankets and clothes, toiletries, non-perishable items and cleaning supplies - all donated by Arnold residents and businesses.

The Sandhills Open Road Challenge donated \$250.00 for rebuilding supplies—including tarps and tools—that were purchased at Mills Hardware.

"The trailer was locked at night, and a sign-in sheet was attached to the trailer so the kids can send everyone thank you notes," said Tami.

The trailer was taken to the Norfolk warehouse, and in the end, some of the items went to Texas and some to Florida, where items were still needed in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma.

And in the famous words of President Ronald Reagan, the sixth grade class learned that, "We can't help everyone, but everyone can help someone."

Rotary met Thursday evening with Todd Thompson sitting in for President Irv Jennings, who had a speaking engagement in North Platte. This article outlines our internal goals. Next week will identify our community goals.

The club has been working on the year's goal since July and has finally identified the most important internal and community goals. The following is a thumbnail sketch of what Rotary intends to accomplish this year.

- Internally increase membership by at least one person. We plan to develop a workable plan to achieve the following goals.

- We plan on participating in Rotary International's goal of eliminating polio worldwide. Last year 37 cases of polio were found all in Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan. Since Rotary and the World Health organization took on polio, it is estimated 16 million people worldwide have been saved from paralysis.

- Have 100 percent participation in Rotary International Foundation. The Arnold club and Minden club are the only clubs in the district that have

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
