## FFA Program Discussed at Joint Board Meeting

The Boards of Education of Callaway and Arnold met on December 1 in the Elementary Resource Room in Arnold to discuss the superintendent contract for 2016-17, and the possibility of FFA in Callaway, and if Arnold would have any interest in sharing courses or a program.

The board considered the half-year of experience and performance evaluations of Superintendent Dawn Lewis, and the completion of her doctoral degree. Mutual agreement of a 5 percent increase from last year's contract, given such consideration, was decided. The contract is posted on the website of each school, in compliance with the Superintendent Pay Transparency Act, before the contract can be approved by each board.

Callaway conducted a survey for students in Grades 6-11 to evaluate interest in an Ag/FFA program. Survey results will be shared at the Callaway December board meeting.

There was discussion on the possibilities of sharing an Ag/FFA program. Logistics would need to be considered at more detail if it was felt the Ag/FFA program was a possibility.

There was discussion on FFA program requirements and potential class offerings.

Arnold will conduct a student survey of its own and hopefully share results at the December board meeting.
