Superintendent Search is Over

Arnold School Principal Dawn Lewis verbally accepted the offer from the Arnold and Callaway School Boards to act as Superintendent, shared between the districts, for the coming school year. Mrs. Lewis accepted the position on Saturday evening, after four applicants from Arcadia, Maywood, Callaway and Arnold were interviewed during a joint meeting of the Arnold and Callaway school boards. The meeting and interview process started early Saturday morning and lasted through the day, with candidates offered tours of both communities.

The candidates met with a committee made up of faculty and staff from both schools, and four of those committee members - two from Arnold and two from Callaway - then met with the two school boards to give their report.

Current Arnold and Callaway Superintendent Pat Osmond, who will retire on June 1, 2015, said all applicants have been notified that the position was offered to Mrs. Lewis.

"A good part of it is being able to work with Dawn right up to June," said Osmond. "One advantage to hiring from within, is the transition is a lot smoother."

Mr. Osmond said that he won't be taking a vacation this

year, and will work with Mrs. Lewis right up to June 1.

"I don't plan on pulling up stakes," said Mr. Osmond. "Anytime Dawn has a question, I'll be available. I am deeply committed to having a smooth transition."

Arnold School will now begin the process of finding a replacement for Mrs. Lewis as principal.

"I am very excited about this opportunity. Thank you all for your support throughout this process," said Mrs. Lewis.

Grades K-12 at Arnold Public Schools will present their Holiday Concert at 7:00 p.m., at the school, on December 11.

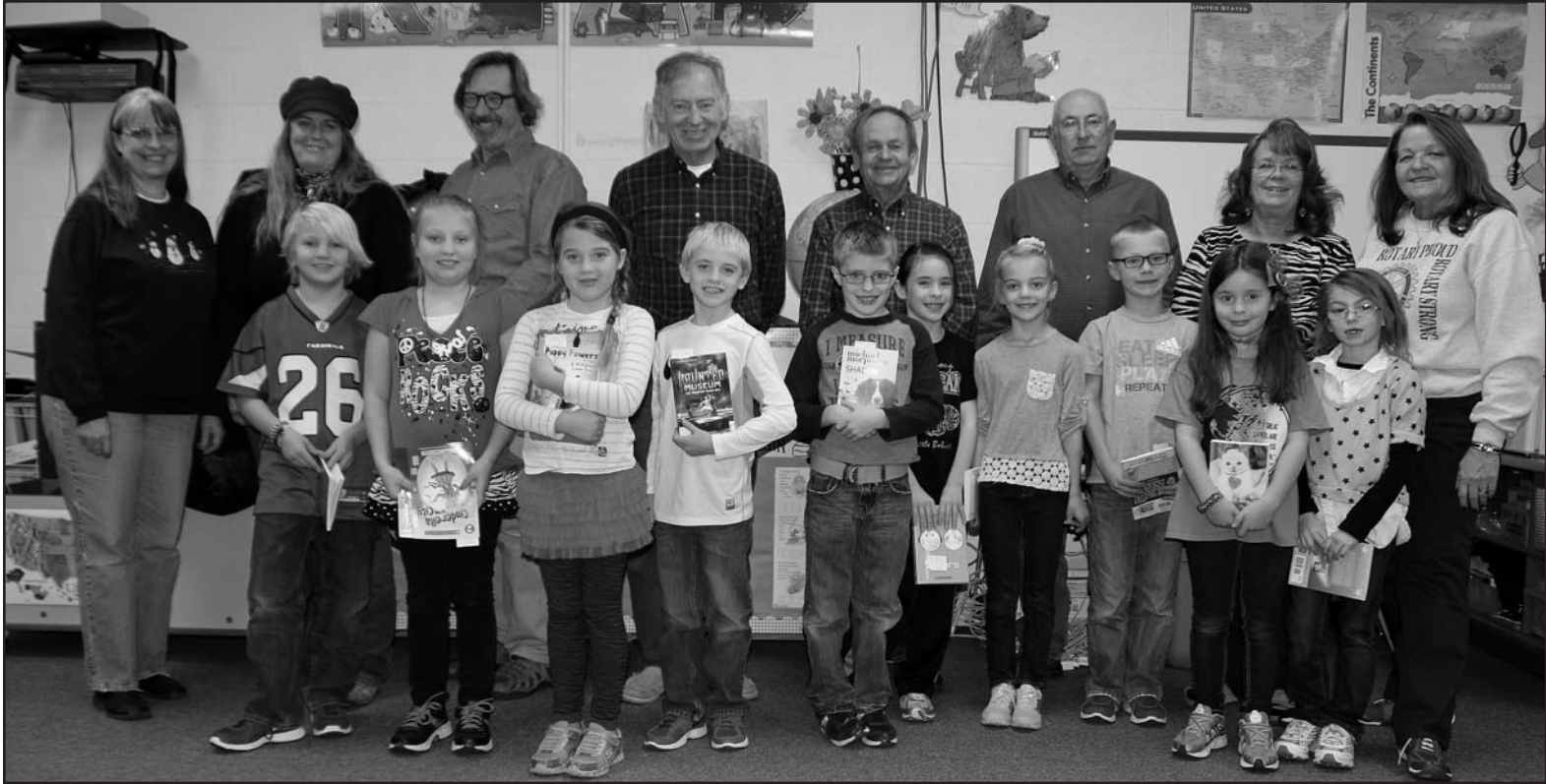
Chamber Bucks Winners
