Chamber Hosts Christmas Around Town

Chamber hosted its annual Christmas Around Town on Saturday, offering shopping, a free movie, Santa's visit and a free soup and sandwich supper.

"We had a good day," said Mills Hardware owner Dena Mills. "We had 160 buying customers and a lot more who just stopped in."

A good turnout of kids enjoyed the free movie "Finding Dory" at the Rialto, with the National Honor Society and Junior Honor Society providing free childcare during the showing.

Santa came to the community center for one hour after the movie and a reported 85 treat bags were handed out

to the kids.

Patty Lamberty, who has organized the free soup and sandwich supper for several years, said attendance was down from previous years but estimates close to 185 people went through the line. After the supper, clean-up was done in no time with a great crew helping out.

Flowers by Shavonne Owner Moves to New Location, Expands

Shavonne Schacher has purchased the building previously occupied by Flower Girl on Walnut Street, and is open for business. Shavonne has been operating her business out of a storefront on West Arnold Avenue since January of 2015, but said she made the move mainly because of the convenient location and to expand into several new merchandise lines, a smoothie and coffee shop and focusing on a well-rounded gift shop.

Shavonne will be focusing on having bouquets pre-made or loose bouquets that are made up and ready to put in your vase at home. On Fridays she will have specials on flowers. The whole month of January will be a customer appreciation

month to appreciate all of the businesses' current and potential customers. There will be different specials each week and the coffee and smoothie shop will open. During the summer, old-fashioned malts and shakes will be served.

In order to expand and start the coffee shop, Shavonne applied for a business loan and accompanying grant through the Arnold Economic Development Corporation.

"We decided to apply for the AEDC loan to keep it local, knowing that the interest goes back to the community and because of the grant," she said.

The Schachers plan on doing some small renovations to the building to in-

crease energy efficiency over the next couple of years.

"We hope to make this a long-term home for our business and help make downtown lively again," she said.

Shavonne's new business hours are Wednesday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and on Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. She plans to hire a part-time person to help with the coffee shop, during holidays, and also during times she is busy with flowers for events or funerals.

Shavonne said she is also looking forward to her kids being involved, as she remembers being young and her parents owning their own small business.

Library's Bake Sale Brings in a Whopping \$1,317.70

Finch Memorial Library's bake sale—held Saturday to raise funds for the building's exterior repairs—was a surprising success. Two hundred twenty-five baked items were donated, and all but ten items were sold for a total of \$1,317.70 raised in one day.

"Brownies, pies, breads, cinnamon rolls, chocolate covered peanuts, homemade caramels, cookies, muffins, bars, toffee, fudge, krispy treats and potatoes sold con-

tinuously all afternoon and during Chamber's appreciation supper," said library board member Rose Bierman. "Of the ten items remaining, four plates of cookies were donated to the Methodist church for a funeral dinner the next day."

Donations for the tuck point project also came in during the week from Sara Buchholz, Bobbie Smith, Karen Olson, Bob and Penny Allen and Doug and Carlene

Lanham, totaling \$1,655.00. Added to the proceeds from the bake sale, the week's total added up to \$2,972.70.

Rose also reports that the Methodist Women's Society donated \$400.00 for the purchase of Christian books, and recently, Arnold Insurance Agency donated a printer/copier.

"It was a great week for the library," said Rose.
