## Town Gets Spring Cleaning

The town got its annual spring cleaning last Monday, as some 80 students and 15 faculty members from Arnold Public Schools, Rotarians, Legion members and other volunteers, fanned out across the town to paint, landscape, rake, trim and haul away branches and debris, pick up trash, and haul furniture and appliances out of residences.

They were everywhere. Volunteers could be found at the Arnold Recreation Area,

Koubek Gardens, the alley behind Koubek Gardens, at the storage units by the Arnold Medical Clinic, on the railroad right of ways, the old tennis court, Old Mill Park and the ball diamond and dugout, the wastewater plant, in the ditch on the east side of the community center, the football field, Devil's Den look-out, the community center, the cemetery and at the library.

Residents were encouraged to "get on the list" weeks in ad-

vance of the clean-up, and many took advantage of it. Some 20 private residences were on the list for the clean-up.

With some 32 locations on the list, it all sounds complicated, but organizers were ready. Volunteers met at the community center, were split into groups, and given instructions for their clean-up area. Once that area was done, the group would return to the center for their next set of instructions, until the list

was completed.

Chamber fed all of the volunteers a lunch of sandwiches, donated salads, cookies and Donna Larsen's famous donuts. Bottled water was supplied to everyone throughout the day.

## Village Board Hires Utility Employee, Pool Manager at Special Meeting

At a special meeting held on April 18, the village board of trustees hired Tory Edwards as a full-time utility employee. Glen Bowers and Superintendent Bill Moser interviewed two applicants, and Moser said they were both good candidates for the job.

Next on the agenda was the hiring of a pool manager. The board went into closed session to discuss the four applicants that applied. After coming out of closed session, the board voted and unanimously approved hiring Eileen Moser as the manager.

Eileen and committee members Aaron Olson and Tim Turley will hire assistant managers from a list of six candidates, and will then hire lifeguards.

The board's pool committee will oversee the operation of the pool and will go over the rules with Eileen Moser.
