Firefighters Battle Blaze at Jim's Bar

In the early morning hours of March 27, a fire at Jim's Bar was spotted and simultaneously called in by two travelers one from Denver and one from Montana. Thirty firemen from Arnold, Stapleton, Callaway, Merna and Broken Bow responded to fight the blaze, with six EMTs standing by.

Arnold Fire Chief Eric Nelson said the fire was called in at 12:18 a.m., and was under control at approximately 1:45 a.m.. Firemen were on the scene until 4:48 a.m.

“We know the fire started in the kitchen,” said Nelson. “The kitchen area is 100 percent damaged, and the remainder of the building has major smoke and water damage. In my opinion, the physical structure of the building is okay, but that will be determined by an insur-

ance adjuster.”

Joe Bob Atkins of Arnold Insurance Agency said the building was insured for full replacement cost.

One Callaway fireman was taken to a local hospital with possible smoke inhalation. He was treated and released.

Jim's Bar was established in 1954 by Jim and Margaret Eastburn, and holds many memories for several generations in the small town of Arnold. The bar has changed hands several times over the years, with Jane Chestnutt owning the business for the past three years.

The State Fire Marshal's office reported it is investigating the March 27 fire at Jim's Bar in Arnold as a crime of arson. Because it is an ongoing investigation details regarding the origin are not available.

First Project Phase

The first phase of improvements to the Arnold Cemetery was completed last Wednesday, when Arnold Principal Joel Morgan and Clay Mohr organized a group of high school volunteers and rounded up the equipment needed to take out the old fence. Installation of a new, white fence will begin in the next couple of weeks. Plans are also being made to remove old trees and plant new ones. Shane Cool, who is among organizers of the cemetery improvement project, said \$25,000.00 that was raised at the Arnold Community Foundation's annual fundraiser is being used for the upgrades, and they are hoping to find more funding to fix the cemetery roads. Also on the project list is straightening markers. “(The cemetery) already looks better with the old fence gone. We are hoping to get a lot of the projects done by Memorial Day,” he said.
