Mary graduated from Kearney State College in 1975 with a bachelor of science degree.





Major Calvin R. King will speak at Memorial Day Services

The 2019 Memorial Day Speaker for Monday’s Memorial Day service will be Major Calvin R King, U.S. Army.

Major King started his army career as a volunteer enlisted in the Kansas National Guard. During his early years in the Guard, he finished his schooling at Fort Hays State and began a career in teaching. His first job was as a high school English teacher and varsity wrestling coach at Russell, Kansas. After 9-11-2001, Calvin was deployed to Qatar and Iraq 2002-2004 as Platoon Sergeant. He then signed up in the active military and served in 2007-2008 in Qatar as Medical Logistics NCOIC (Non-Commissioned-Officer-In-Charge).

Then Sergeant King attended Officer Candidate School and became a Second Lieutenant and served as Brigade Medical Supply Officer on yet another deployment to Iraq from 2010-2011. He has since moved through the officer ranks and had a harrowing deployment as a captain in Afghanistan,

where he was wounded by hostile action by an IED (Improvised Explosive Device) and received his second Bronze Star and a Purple Heart. Major King and his family, wife, Diana; sons, Ethan and Jax and daughter, Stella, have recently returned from a three year assignment in Germany and are currently stationed at Fort Riley. Calvin is the oldest son of Wade and Leitha (Phillips) King of Ellis, Kansas, and nephew of John Phillips and Melva Phillips of Arnold.

Saluting Our EMTs

May 19-25, 2019, is the 45th annual National EMS Week. Village Board Hears Reports at Monthly Meeting

Several agenda items were discussed at last week’s village board meeting, and discussion was held on flood relief.

Grant Received

AEDC Director Cheryl Carson reported that the AEDC has been awarded a grant from Custer County Tourism Visitors to assist with improvement projects at the Arnold Recreation Lake Area. Some of the funds awarded will go towards the entry sign project. Carson said that Clay Mohr has set a tentative date of June 1 for the entry sign to be installed.

Upcoming Event Approved

Board members gave Margie McDowell and Sal Hilderbrant permission to hold the Sandhills Automotive Show & Shine at the Arnold Recreation Area on Saturday, September 7. The event will be held from noon to 4:00 p.m., with the Rialto Theatre selling concessions at the picnic shelter.

Swimming Lessons Donation

Pool manager Shavonne Schacher reported that Eric and Yvonne Brast have offered to donate \$10.00 per child to help with the cost of swimming lessons. The cost to parents will be \$5.00 for one week and \$15.00 for two weeks. Swimming lessons will be July 8-12 and July 22-26.

FEMA Funding

At the meeting, the board decided not to pursue funding from FEMA for the following reasons: according to NEMA, the village will be required to join the National Flood Insurance Program within a certain time period, and the board does not want to join the program at this time; Doug De Laune and Patty Lamberty attended a webinar on procurement training and learned that the village engineer is unable to submit a proposal for engineering services since he prepared the preliminary damage assessment; and the board decided to have the village employees do the work and not procure for an engineer or solicit bids to do the work.

In other business, the board:

- Voted to proceed with steps to sell the triangular parcel of vacated West Lincoln to Max and Joan Smith and Margie McDowell, plus surveyor fees.

- Voted to provide the money necessary for Personal Protective Equipment plus flame resistant bib overalls and jackets to full-time employees.

- Heard that the village has received a check from EMC Insurance for \$8,875.05. Heard that the village received \$500.00 from the Salvation Army, Custer County branch, to help with the cost of swimming lessons.

Fundraising Starts for 3rd Phase of City Park Improvements

It’s visibly apparent the recent changes which have taken place at the Arnold City Park. There’s a sea of newly laid blue crumb rubber mulch, as well as a new play structure specifically designed for the 2-5 year old’s to explore and inspire their imaginations.

Three areas of improvement were identified for this project. First, adding a structure which would be age appropriate for 2-5 year old’s, allowing them to play on equipment specific to their size, age, and motor skill level and adding one bay to the toddler swing area and hanging the bucket seats Arnold had been awarded in a contest.

Next, refreshing of the settled crumb rubber mulch originally laid six years ago, as well as ordering enough to cover the expansion area. Lastly, replacing the merry-go-round which had reached its maximum mechanical life.

Phase one of the funding was used to purchase the 2-5 year old’s play structure. The brand new play structure picked out originally cost a total of \$12,720.00, but Sterling West offered 40% off the structure, and a discount of 50% on shipping as well. The final cost for the new play structure would

come in at \$7,512.00 - a significant savings for the community of Arnold. Donations from an outdoor movie family fundraiser held last April, area businesses, individuals, organizations, and a \$1,200 grant from the Arnold Foundation helped pay for the structure in its entirety.

Next, a grant was applied for with the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality to receive a 50% matching funds to purchase the crumb rubber mulch required under new playground structures and equipment. The grant applied for not only would help purchase one-half of the crumb rubber mulch for the AEDC portion of the Arnold City Park, but help pay for half the crumb rubber mulch to put under a different play structure purchased by Becky Daily, for which she has plans to install at the Arnold Recreation Area south of town with the assistance of Rotary and community individuals. The total cost for both areas combined was \$22,890.00 in which the AEDC received the award of \$11,445.00 to pay for half the cost from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality. The last matching funds for purchasing the crumb rubber mulch was provided by the Village of

Arnold in the amount of \$7,630.00 and the Arnold Community Foundation with \$3,815.00.

On Community Clean Up Day this past April, school students and staff, as well as community volunteers were able to assist in expanding the playground borders, and disbursing two-thirds of the new crumb rubber mulch at the city park location.

This week volunteers from a Farm Credit Services grant awarded to the AEDC, will be on hand to help install the 2 to 5-year-old play structure, and add the last remaining expansion borders and crumb rubber mulch.

This now takes us to the last phase of fundraising to complete the playground project entirely. There is a June 1st fundraiser planned to start getting money together to purchase the new merry-go-round, and complete the toddler bay swing addition.
