In her letter published in the 2018 issue of the *Arnold Alumni News*, Remund said she left here feeling destined for great things and a great future. After graduating from Hastings College, Remund moved to South Dakota and began a career in sales, marketing and development of ag-related businesses. Remund's employ-

Grants, volunteers make Arnold cemetery improvements possible

Last summer, the Arnold Cemetery was nothing for the community to be proud of. It had unsightly trees, leaning stones, an ugly fence and weeds. Not anymore. The cemetery will look different this year thanks to several workers - mostly volunteers.

A wind storm last summer and another this winter found Shane Cool and his employees, plus some other volunteers, using their big equipment, chain saws and hard work to fell approximately 30 to 40 cedar trees. Some of the trees were fallen from the wind, others were rotten inside and ready to fall.

The Arnold Foundation has elected to pay for and plant up to 20 trees to replace the ugly cedar trees. Trees selected are:

- Two Burr Oaks: This species that grows to 50 ft. tall is native to Nebraska so it should do well.

- Three Greenspire Lindens. With a height of 35 ft. and a spread of 25', this species is noted for being more disease resistant than other types of Linden trees.

- One Royale Red Maple. While maples are noted to be fast growing trees, this is the hardest of the maple species. This tree was chosen to add some visual interest to the cemetery.

- Five Royal Raindrops Crabapple. These trees, that grow about 20 ft. tall and have a spread of 15 ft., do not have apples on them; rather, they have small berries that do not normally fall off, but stay on for birds to eat.

All of the selected trees fall into the category of slower growing trees, which means they are stronger. With Nebraska's gusty winds and inconsistent rainfall, the focus was on trees that would be hardy, strong and not thirsty.

The chain link fence around the cemetery was needing repair. The Arnold Community Foundation decided to put a new fence on the west and south side of the cemetery. Volunteers tore down the old fence and money from the Edna B. Peterson estate paid for installing the new two-rail fence. Tyler Long, local fence builder, installed the fence purchased from Country Estates in Cozad. The cost of the fence was approximately \$12,000.00.

The Arnold Community Foun-

dation also chose to repair the oil road. This 5,000 square ft. project will cost from \$8,000.00 to \$10,000.00.

Many of the headstones had settled, and some of the marble tops had fallen over. It is estimated that 75 headstones were needing repaired. Volunteers and some paid workers spent several hours straightening these headstones and glueing the marble tops that had fallen.

The worst of the headstones are

straight now, and all of the tops have been glued.

The Arnold Foundation also

wants a speaker stand for Memorial Day and Veterans Day services. The Foundation will

purchase and build a gazebo

for these services. The gazebo

may also be used by families

visiting the cemetery wishing

to be protected from rain and

other related issues. The cost of

the gazebo and construction

will be from \$3,000.00 to

Ret. US Army Colonel Sen. Tom Brewer will speak at Memorial Day Services

Sen. Brewer will be the special speaker at Monday's Memorial Day services at the Arnold Cemetery. The senator is a retired US Army Colonel. He served our nation in uniform for over 37 years.

He began his career as an enlisted man in the Nebraska Army National Guard. Sen. Brewer attended college at Doane University in Crete on an ROTC scholarship.

Sen. Brewer was commissioned as an Infantry Officer in

1982. He later graduated from the toughest school in the Army and became an Airborne Ranger like his father before him. He later attended US Army Flight School and became a helicopter pilot. Sen. Brewer commanded an Air Cavalry Troop and served in a number of staff assignments including serving with the Secretary of Defense on the National Airborne Operations Command Center at Offutt AFB.

Mr. Erikson is a 1941 graduate of Arnold High School, and the Foundation was very pleased to learn that he had remembered Arnold in his will.

Mr. Erikson joined the Arnold School system in his middle school years and became part of the class of 23 students who graduated in 1941. Bobbie Smith believes he is the last living member of that class.

While in high school, Mr. Erikson was the business manager for the annual staff and was in the band and pep band.

“The time that he spent in Arnold must have been very enjoyable for him to remember Arnold and to honor our school and community with this very generous bequest,” said Foundation board member Bev Engleman.

The School Foundation awards two \$1,500.00 scholarships each year to seniors in the

graduating class. One scholarship goes to a senior who plans on entering a vocational college, and one scholarship goes to a senior who plans on attending a college or university. Because of Mr. Erikson's generosity, the Foundation will be able to continue offering these scholarships for a very long time.
