Annual Community Clean-Up Day Once Again a Success

Sixty Arnold students came marching out of the school on a beautiful spring morning in April to participate in the annual town clean-up project. The students, some with rakes and tools in hand, walked in an orderly fashion down the street to the community center, where they immediately started setting up tables for the Alan Dailley funeral dinner. Melody Jennings, who is clean-up day organizer for Rotary and was at the community center where clean-up day tasks were assigned, said it was video-worthy, as the line of kids came down the street towards the community center, filed in quietly and immediately got to the task at hand.

When asked why the kids were so well behaved when they had been set free to the great outdoors from a day in the classroom, Principal Dawn Lewis said it was a piece of cake, to be honest.

"I told the students to walk

down to the community center together, and I was about five minutes behind them. I told them that we needed to help set up for the funeral, and we would feed them Donna's (Larson) donuts when they were finished! And that is exactly what they did! I hope everyone realizes what great kids we have!" said Mrs. Lewis.

This was the school's fifth year that it has completed some sort of community service project, and it was the third year with the community clean-up.

"The kids look forward to this day every year. They enjoy helping out and seeing the rewards of their labor!" said Mrs. Lewis. "I have never once heard them complain. It is truly wonderful."

Mrs. Lewis worked closely with Melody Jennings and Patty Lamberty to get the 32 adults and 60 students, and their chores, organized. Either a teacher or a Rotarian was assigned to each group of about

five students, and the chores were tackled one by one until everything was finished.

Teams picked up branches at the Arnold Recreation Area, cleaned up the alley behind Koubek Gardens of sand and trash, picked up trash around the storage units by the Arnold Medical Clinic, picked up trash along the railroad right-of-way, picked up branches and trash at the tennis courts, Old Mill Park and ball diamond, and around the wastewater plant.

In addition, about 30 locations downtown and in residential areas were on the list, where yards were raked, branches were picked up, flower beds cleaned out and debris and sometimes furniture were hauled away. Two main areas where teams helped with landscaping were at the community center and Koubek Gardens. Village crews operated loaders where needed, such as bringing in mulch to these two locations.

Rotarians pitched in, painting all of the picnic tables at both the Arnold Recreation Area (ARA) and at the city park, with the village paying for the paint, and with some help from students. Meanwhile, another student team painted the

playground equipment at the ARA, and it is suggested that residents take a drive out and look at their artistry.

Fourth graders were also involved, picking up trash along their designated highway for the adopt-a-highway program.

Chamber paid for and provided lunch for 90 volunteers at the community center, serving sloppy joes, baked beans, salads and desserts, with some of the latter two donated by residents.

The village provided a roll-off

free of charge during the entire month of April so that residents could spruce up, and Legion members were busy picking up metal from anyone who called.

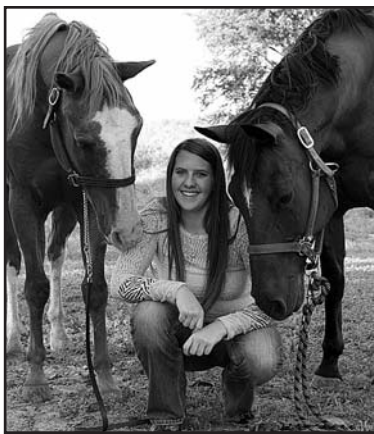
Legion member Mike Harvey said members picked up quite a bit of metal on the day of the clean-up, but overall an amazing 16 tons were picked up during the month.
