May Moisture Slows Planting

Total moisture as of May 31 for the year is at 5.87 inches, compared to last year's 5.46. This year's May total was 4.75 inches of timely moisture, coming with several different storms. After a slow winter of receiving very little moisture and no moisture in March, welcome rains began to fall in April, with a very wet May, compared to last year's May, when only 1.79 inches fell. Last year, June saw 9.85 inches, so time

will tell to see if the wet trend will continue.

Steady rains falling through the month made planting difficult with cooler temperatures and late frosts plaguing the area.

As of May 24, planted corn across the state was at 92 percent, near 96 percent for last year and the five-year average. Emerged was at 73 percent, near the 70 last year, but ahead of 67 average. Soybeans planted

was at 59 percent, behind 85 last year and 73 average.

Emerged was at 22 percent, behind 38 last year and 31 average. Sorghum planted was at 50 percent, near 53 last year and ahead of 41 average.

With the dry winter, pasture for the summer was becoming questionable before the rains came. Pasture and range conditions are rated at 4 percent very poor, 8 poor, 29 fair, 53 good and 6 excellent.

City-Wide Garage Sale is This Saturday

Bargain shoppers from surrounding towns will be pulling into Arnold with pickups and trailers this Saturday, June 6, for the annual Chamber-sponsored City-Wide Garage Sale. Seventeen locations will be on the map, with some sales listed as multi-family.

The Goodwill Donation Trailer will return to town, and will be set up on the south side of the city park from Friday, June 5, to Thursday, June 11.

Donations of clothing and household items that are in

good condition, and all personal computers, printers, monitors and computer accessories can be placed inside the trailer. Tax donation slips will be available at the trailer. Due to lack of space, the truck will not accept televisions, furniture or large appliances.

Revenue earned through the sale of donations at Goodwill retail stores help support programs for persons who have disabilities or barriers to employment. Goodwill's mission is to assist these individuals in achieving independence in the community, including providing job training and job placement.

Items can also be taken to the St. Agnes Thrift Center.

Village, Rural Residents See Rise in Valuations

Most Arnold Village residents did a double take when opening up their 2015 Notice of Property Valuation mailed out last week from the county assessors office.

The average increase from prior year 2014 to current 2015 was 15 percent, said Custer County Assessor Connie Braithwaite. Some reported their valuation on homes and buildings going up as much as 37 percent.

The assessor said that by state statute, the office has to reevaluate property once every six years, and is required to be as close to 100 percent of market value as possible. This was the six year cycle for the Arnold Village and the rural area surrounding it.

The market is set by sales using a three-year history. Homes and buildings are evaluated on square footage, age, condition, style and improvements. Braithwaite said Arnold has seen a lot of home sales and some new construction and improvements, which contributes to the increased market values.

Ag land valuations, which are

required to be at 75 percent of market value, are re-evaluated every year. This year ag land valuations took a bit hit, going up 30 percent.

Residents also questioned why the deadline to protest the valuations was June 1 - giving most only Monday to obtain the form and submit it to the assessor's office for review by the supervisors. The assessor said the June 1 deadline was an error, and residents do have until June 30 to submit a protest.
