## Bike Rally Grows As Event Returns For 4th Year

Word is getting out about the annual Devil's Den Bike Rally in Arnold. Held the second weekend in July, this year's event drew 111 entrants.

"We had several locals that were not able to go on the run this year, yet we still had a strong amount of registrations. That means word is getting out to farther parts of the state," said motorcycle rally treasurer Heather Hagler.

The day's main event - the Poker Run - was won by Andre Voss with a Full House. Julie Wells placed second with a Flush and Bill Demars placed third with a Straight Ace High. The scenic run started at Keane's Suzy's Pizza or Jim's Bar in Arnold, and went on to Furbar at Anselmo, Sylvester's at Broken Bow, Big Jim's at Oconto and Hanger 22 at Callaway. The final card was dealt at the Arnold Community Center.

A dunk tank manned by the Heartland Hellcats roller derby team, a visit by the Midwest MedAir helicopter, a silent auction, and four bands also provided

entertainment throughout the day.

By day's end, the AC/DC tribute band, "Shoot to Thrill," drew the largest crowd, playing until after midnight.

Each year, the Devil's Den Rally makes charitable dona-

tions to Autism Awareness, the TeamMates program and Out of the Darkness, for suicide prevention. In 2014, over \$3,000.00 was raised for charities and local organizations that donate their time at the rally. The event also helps the town's economy, as bikers and people joining them are seen in local businesses throughout the weekend. Hagler said money is also spent locally for supplies and prizes. A final amount raised for this year's event was not available by press time.

## Next Blood Drive July 20

The American Red Cross and the Arnold community will hold a blood drive on Monday, July 20, from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., at the Arnold Community Center.

During the summer months of June, July and August, on average about two fewer donors schedule an appointment to give blood at each Red Cross blood drive then what patients need. This can add up to more than 100,000 fewer donations during the summer.

- Every day this summer is a chance to give hope to patients in need. The American Red Cross urges eligible donors to choose their day to give hope by donating blood.

- In a spring survey of Red Cross blood donors, nearly 90 percent plan to take a vacation this summer, potentially making them less available to donate blood.

- Though summer is one of the most challenging times of year to collect enough blood to meet the needs of hospital patients, the need for blood is constant.

- Patients don't get a summer holiday or vacation from needing blood and platelets. Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs a blood transfusion.

- Each day the Red Cross must collect about 15,000 blood donations to serve patients at approximately 2,600 hospitals nationwide.

## Auction Find Appraised at Antique Road Show

### Hilderbrants, of Arnold, have paintings appraised

Originally launched in Britain in 1979, and a familiar name in most American households since its American debut in 1997, Antiques Roadshow features local antiques owners who bring in items to be appraised by experts. Provenance, history and value on the items are discussed on the television series.

In April of 2015, Antiques Roadshow announced one of their 2015 Summer tour stops would be Omaha, Nebraska. Arnold residents Dave and Sally Hilderbrant were watching an episode of Antiques Roadshow when the announcement was made.

The roadshow announced that antique owners could sign up for tickets free of charge prior to April 7 and a random drawing would be held and tickets would be given to 5,000 lucky people.

"I had lost all hope of going," said Sally. "Then one day, out of nowhere, the tickets showed up in the mail."

Hilderbrants knew exactly what they were going to have appraised at the roadshow.

Several years ago, they had purchased a box of 12 paintings for \$2.00 at an auction in Stapleton. Of those 12 paintings, two were from the same artist and seemed to be originals.

The Hilderbrants set out for

their Antique Roadshow adventure on June 27, at 8:00 a.m. After going through a series of stations, they and their

seascape artwork were directed to the correct appraiser.

The appraiser confirmed that the paintings were real and the

artist was Cesar Buenaventura, of the Filipino nationality. The paintings were dated from the 1970s. Each one was valued at

\$800.00 to \$1,200.00.

"For that price, the paintings returned home and will stay on our walls for us to enjoy," Sally commented.

Of interest, Buenaventura (1919-1983) was known for his impressionistic landscapes. He was born in Torzo, Tondo, and his canvasses generally conveyed a quiet, serene, and tranquil impression. He won first prize at the 1950 National Art contest held every five years at the FEU. In 1955, was chosen one of the country's Top Ten Artist; received an ASA Artist of the Phil award of the Phil award, 1956; was first prize winner at the Open Art Exhibit in Luneta in 1957, and work was chosen Outstanding Landscape of the Year by the Academy of Filipino Artist.

A third painting, by a different artist, was appraised and estimated at \$50.00.

Unfortunately, the Hilderbrants will not be featured on an episode of Antique Roadshow.

"When your item is being appraised, if it is chosen as a significant one for the television show, you are taken to a different location for a second appraisal that is filmed," Sally said. "We were not chosen to go to the second location."

Part of the Summer Tour 2015, the Omaha location saw approximately 10,000 unearthed treasurers that were looked at by 70 appraisers. Episodes will begin in January of 2016 during the Roadshow's 20th anniversary, with three separate episodes created for each location.
