Bobcat Scoreboards Go Digital

A new wireless, digital scoreboard, sporting South Loup colors and the Bobcat mascot, will be in use at the Arnold football field this season, replacing the 30-plus-year-old analog board that was in need of repairs.

Activities Director Jarod Rush organized the effort to have the scoreboards replaced at both the Arnold and Callaway fields.

"The old scoreboard at Arnold is believed to have been purchased in 1983 or 1984. It was turning on or shutting off during games. The wiring was believed to have some kind of short in it, and because it was an analog board, they no longer make parts for it," he said.

Discussion on replacing the board started after Christmas last year, and the \$11,500.00 project was presented to the school board in March. When a possible plan was in place, the next step was finding scoreboard advertisers to help pay for the project. With enough interest found, the school board gave the go-ahead to start selling advertisements in the spring.

In Arnold, eight spots were sold to Great Plains Communications, Country Partners, Pinnacle Bank, Reed's Food Center, Arnold Insurance Agency, First State Insurance, Keane's Suzy's Pizza, and Agri-Affiliates. No grants were used for the board itself, as the school and advertisers paid for it, but grants were received from the Arnold Community Foundation and SORC to purchase a separate message board.

Rush said the \$11,500.00 cost was for the board and controller only, and did not include

the cost of getting electricity to the board and the sponsor panels and ads.

The board arrived the middle of July. At the same time, Callaway, who Arnold co-ops sports with, was proceeding with the same project. Lots of volunteer labor was used in both Arnold and Callaway, and the two schools saved about \$1,000.00 each by taking the old boards down and putting the new ones up. Ed Lashley of Redfern Electric hooked up the board in

Arnold, and Roy Callahan took care of Callaway's. Existing poles were cleaned up and painted to match the signs in both towns.

Volunteers who helped included: Rush, Clay Mohr, Arnold Principal Joel Morgan, Callaway Principal Heath Birkel, Mike Weverka, Duane Bowers, Rusty Wykoff and Shane Cool, who provided his boom truck which was used to pick up the old boards and the new boards. Rush said it would

have been a real pain without him. Robby Keeney provided his bucket truck in Callaway.

Clay Mohr and Arnold School House Graphic Products saved both districts a lot of money. The old scoreboards were used for the sponsor panels that go underneath the new boards. Mohr's class will also do the sponsor advertising that slides in those panels. This saved each district about \$2,000.00.

"The benefits of the new system is that it is wireless," said

Rush. "We didn't have to hard wire them and tear up any of the field to put new wire in the ground. Everything should be faster and more durable."

With the installation of new boards, players and fans will no longer hear a horn at the end of the quarter.

"There is a point of emphasis from the NSAA that you do not sound the horn because kids were stopping play on the horn, and some were getting hurt," said Rush. "The play is not over because the horn goes off. The play continues until the runner is down or the pass is incomplete or the official blows his whistle."

Rush said at some point, both communities plan on replacing the scoreboards in the gymnasiums, but that will probably have to wait a few years. Sponsors agreed to pay \$2,500.00 for a five year period. However, the schools will not get all that money up front. Sponsors can choose to break that amount up into \$500.00 payments each year, so the schools had to come up with the entire cost of the boards. Then, over five years, they will get that money back from the sponsors.

"Both communities were very generous and willing to help out with the scoreboards," said Rush. "It continues to amaze me how we can get things accomplished by working together. So many people are willing to help out with our projects and to make this co-op stand out. I hear so many horror stories about co-ops, but Arnold and Callaway seem willing to do whatever we need to do to make it work."
