First in line was the Legion and V.F.W. Color Guard, and bringing up the rear were members of the Arnold Volunteer Fire Department. The Arnold Band played “The National Anthem”, while the American flag was saluted. In all, 145 people went down the route, with many following this year’s theme of “Good Ol’ Days.” Dena reported that

there were 49 entries, with 10 of those being business entries, which was great to see.

The parade kicked off a day of the 1st Annual Community Olympics, a free barbecue of pulled pork sandwiches, entertainment, cosmic bowling and a street dance with live music featuring “Modern Kowboy.”

Ribbon Cuttings Set for This Friday

The Arnold Economic Development Corporation will be celebrating the Arnold community’s continued growth and progress this Friday, September 21, with two ribbon cuttings.

At private functions starting at 9:00 a.m., Senator Matt Williams and representatives from the Nebraska Economic Development office will meet with community representatives, be introduced to Jodi Carson and tour BrewBakers.

At 10:30 a.m., the press will be invited to interview Senator Williams.

At 10:45 a.m., the public is invited to celebrate BrewBakers’ grand opening at the ribbon cutting ceremony.

The group will then walk across the street to Farmhouse Antiques & Flea Market - a pop-up business that will open this week in Hotel Custer. After meeting owners Kim Beshaler and Gail Reed, and touring the business, a ribbon cutting will be held at 11:30 a.m.

Ballot Certified for the 2018 General Election

LINCOLN – Secretary of State John Gale announced today that the final list of candidates for offices across the state has been reviewed and certified by his office.

“My office has finalized the certification of candidates that file with the State of Nebraska,” Gale said. “This certification is a vital part of the process and ensures that candidate names and party affiliations are listed correctly, among other details.”

The 2018 general election ballot will also allow voters to vote on expanding Medicaid Eligibility with Initiative Measure 427, following the submission of signatures to the Secretary of State and the dismissal by the Nebraska Supreme Court of a lawsuit challenging its placement.

“In accordance with the placement of this initiative measure on the ballot, my office will be hosting a hearing in each of the three congressional districts,” said Gale. “These sessions will allow Nebraskans to have their questions addressed and are required under state law.” The announcement of the dates and locations of these hearings are forthcoming.

In addition, informational pamphlets on Initiative Measure 427 are being created by the Secretary of State’s office. They will be available in county election official offices and the office of the Secretary of State by the end of September.
