Music Teacher Retires After 22 Years

At the end of the 2019-2020 school year, long-time Arnold Schools music teacher Chrysanne Bailey will happily retire, and she's got a lot to look forward to.

“For me, it was just knowing that it was time. I want more time for personal things, I guess. I’m not getting up at 5:00 a.m. unless I’m getting on a plane; I’d like to plant my garden before mid-June; I’d like to mow my yard one more time in October; I’d like to pick my tomatoes and beans in the daytime instead of when it’s starting to get dark; I’d like to visit my sisters when there’s more than a 3 or 4-day weekend to do it,” she said.

Chrysanne graduated from Hastings High School and Hastings College with

her bachelor’s degree in music education. She has also earned 36 hours graduate credit in music education at UNK.

Ms. Bailey has had an interesting career since graduating from college. After teaching music for 10 years, she worked for 12 years in the newspaper business. She was a state circulation sales representative for the Omaha World Herald, serving 11 Nebraska counties and three Kansas counties recruiting carriers, distributors, running sales promotions and handling transportation issues for 10 years and two years for the North Platte Telegraph doing the same work.

Ms. Bailey came to work at Arnold Public Schools in the fall of 1998. Do the math and that’s 22 years of driving back and forth from her home in Brady to Arnold. She teaches Grades K-12 vocal music and Grades 5-12 instrumental music. She works with students on

solos, auditions, small ensembles and sometimes extra lessons after school. Just last week, she helped Kenna Rogers prepare her recorded scholarship audition for Wayne State College.

Some of the highlights she’s experienced while teaching here include getting superior ratings from all three judges for band three years, and for choir two years. Music students Chelsea Knight and Mariette Magill were selected twice for the All-State Choir.

She also has fond memories of the elementary Christmas musicals performed over the years. She has taken students to see the Cornhusker marching band exhibition show in August and to see the highlights of their marching show in December. 
