1950 A.H.S. Grad Keeps on Trucking

Dave Sheets is one of the oldest over-the-road drivers in nation.

Most people closing in on 90 years old don't know a lot about social media, or don't care to. Dave Sheets, a 1950 graduate of A.H.S., is one of them. When the North Dakota Highway Patrol tweeted a photo and commended Dave for his safety as an over-the-road truck driver and KVVU of Bismark, North Dakota, followed with a short story about him online, what happened next was something he didn't anticipate.

Dave, who is one of the oldest truck drivers in the nation, had made his way into North Dakota and was pulled over to participate in International Roadcheck, an annual event when certified inspectors conduct compliance, enforcement and educational initiatives targeted at motor carrier, vehicle and driver safety. After the check, NDHP tweeted, commending “Mr. Sheets” for keeping his 2000 Peterbilt in top condition. His dedication to safety earned him a CVSA decal after the inspection.

Dave, who has driven for Savannah Transport, based in suburban Salt Lake City, for more than 25 years, was described by owner Terry Crawford as a “terrific, old-school truck driver” who can “outdo” most of his younger drivers in KVVU's story.

For Dave, delivering general cargo thousands of miles - including hazardous materials - to several Western and Central states isn't a big deal. He's been doing it since the 1970s.

“The inspector told me that the condition of my truck and the age impressed him. I was dressed decent and didn't look like a scrounge, so he took a picture. As of last Sunday (May 2), there has been over 6,000 hits on the story,” said Dave, who most likely didn't even know what “hits” were before stopping at the roadcheck.

Dave started receiving calls from as far away as California. The long-time resident of Loveland, Colorado, was becoming a person of interest on social media and is still drawing a lot of attention.

Laughing, he said, “One wanted to buy me a meal and two wanted to buy my truck.”

After graduating from A.H.S., Dave stayed on the farm “up in the valley” for about a year. He fell into a job hauling butter from the Arnold and Callaway creameries to Omaha twice a week. On his way back, he would pick up all kinds of freight in all the little towns in-between. One time he picked up school desks and had to find his way to all the rural schools for delivery.

“You never knew what you were going to get. Most of the time I was driving a 2-ton

Family of R.E. Allen Is Present for Rededication of Park

The city park was rededicated to R.E. Allen - the founder of the town of Arnold - last Friday, May 21st. Several of Allen's descendants were present for the ceremony from the states of Arizona, Oregon, and California. Standing in front of the newly installed brick pillar entrance to the park, it was an emotional moment for the family as the covered art deco-style sign reading R.E. & L.L. Allen Memorial City Park was unveiled for the first time.

“We were speechless,” said Allen's great-grandson Dennis McGuire. “Emotional with a Capital E,” said another great-grandson, Todd Miller.

In October of 2020, McGuire sent a request to the Village Board that the name of the Arnold City Park be returned back to the name of the R.E. Allen Park. The land for the park was given to the town by Allen from the R.E. Allen Addition.

McGuire mainly worked with AEDC Director Cheryl Carson in planning the project. The family paid for one-half the cost of the sign.

Todd's 101-year-old father from Arizona was able to view the rededication through Zoom.

The family has all spent time in Arnold and take great pride in their family history.

“Arnold still has the same feel to it. It's a warm and friendly feeling,” said McGuire.
