## Funding Available from USDA to Protect Groundwater

LINCOLN, Neb. Oct. 25, 2021 – The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service has funding available to assist landowners in source water protection priority areas to install conservation practices. Interested landowners have until Nov. 19, 2021, to apply.

John Wilson, acting state conservationist for NRCS in Nebraska said, “Since nearly all Nebraskans get their drinking water from groundwater, it's important we work together to help protect this resource from contamination.”

Agricultural land located in the source water protection priority areas (see map) may be eligible to receive financial assistance.

Nebraska NRCS is now accepting applications for source water protection funding. Approved applicants can receive funding to install conservation practices used to address water quality that include:

- Nutrient management
- Irrigation water management
- Cover crops
- Conversion of flood to pivot or subsurface drip irrigation systems.

NRCS field office staff can determine if applicants are eligible for source water protection priority area financial assistance.

Applications are accepted anytime, but to be considered for funding in 2022, applications must be received by Nov. 19, 2021. Visit your local NRCS field office to learn more.

## A.H.S. One-Act Team Will Start Season November 6 at Gothenburg Festival

Arnold High School's One-Act Team will take to the stage for their first performance of the season on Saturday, November 6, at the Gothenburg Festival. The thespians will present “The Diviners” - a full-length drama by Jim Leonard, Jr. set in a small Indiana town in the 1930s.

“The Diviners” is a story of faith and friendship in Depression-era Indiana. A disillusioned Kentucky preacher named C. C. Showers takes work on a farm in a fictional hamlet named Zion - population 40 - where the local soothsayer is a raving teenage boy. The youth has been abnormally terrified of water since age four when his mother drowned saving him. Miraculously, Buddy seems to have been left with a gift: he can locate precious underground aquifers. Buddy is a diviner. The two become fast friends and C.C. soon finds himself acting as Buddy's mentor and teacher. He seems to be able to relate to Buddy in ways that most people can't. Shortly after settling in, C. C. reveals that he is a former preacher who has lost faith in his vocation. That knowledge changes everything. The townsfolk have been praying for a preacher. The conflict of interests soon evolves into a crisis that leads to a great tragedy.

The Diviners is described a splendidly complex, deeply moving play. It is in turns humorous, beautiful, and tragic; and surprisingly speaks of many present day concerns with gentle wisdom.

Students meet first quarter AR goal, elementary principal gets taped to a tree

During the first quarter of each school year, students in Grades K-12 must meet the Accelerated Reading (AR) goal set by Mrs. Moninger. If they don't, the principal gets to continue sitting behind his desk or roaming the halls. If they meet the challenge, the principal is in for whatever wild idea is dreamed up for that particular year.

This year's AR goal was 3,500 points, and with the clock ticking down, the students exceeded the goal, earning 3,507 points.
