Back-to-Back Champions

Arnold’s One-Act Team Wins NSAA Class D-2 State Title

Arnold’s One-Act team and their coaches once again did justice to the marvelous play “The Diviners” at the NSAA State Play Production Championships held December 8 at the Johnny Carson Theater in Norfolk. Arnold received all first-place rankings from the state judges and was awarded the D-2 Championship trophy for the second year in a row.

Telling the story of a disturbed young man and his friendship with a disenchanted preacher in southern Indiana in the early 1930s, the actors received high praise from the judges. “You moved me emotionally. So powerful. One of the strongest performances I’ve seen this season in any class! Young ladies and young men – this was wonderful!” said one judge. Another judge commented, “You just presented

one of the best shows I have EVER seen in my LIFE! I felt every emotion possible. It was an honor to judge you.” Judges #3 and #4 agreed, saying, “Best acting, best temp, best production, best everything!” and “My jaw is on the floor. This ensemble is perfection. So much talent on this stage.” The following Arnold actors received D2 Outstanding Performance Awards: Colbi Smith, Reagan Cool, Lance Jones, De-

laney Rogers, Gracie Neth, and Ella Cool. Reagan Cool received the highest, most prestigious honor at the state level...D2 Outstanding Female Performer of the Year for her role as Buddy Layman, a loveable young boy with special needs as the result of a near drowning. He is both terrified of water and has the uncanny ability to predict the weather and divine for water. Reagan played the role of Buddy so con-

vincingly that most people, including the judges, did not know that she is a female. “We called ahead to the NSAA to communicate with officials so they would have the correct information and have her in the proper category for acting awards,” said Director Lana Cool. A District judge gave high accolades to both Reagan and
