## Finch Library Begins Fundraiser to Replace Roof's Clay Tiles

Purchasing a tile can help roofing project.

Finch Memorial Library is starting a fundraiser to help replace the green clay tiles that are original to the almost 100 year old roof. Board member Rose Bierman said that some of the tiles are broken and some are just cracked. In addition, the underlayment needs replaced, which has resulted in some water damage to the interior of the building. Workers who specialize in tile roofs will be in the area soon.

In phase 1 of the project, the tile all needs carefully removed and stored and installation of an odd lot of Heritage shingles roof system will follow. The tiles that actually need replaced

will be ordered from the same company in Ohio that manufactured the original roof tiles for the library 98 years ago.

In Phase 2, the Heritage shingles will be removed and the underlayment, edge metal, valley metal, cedar lumber along the eaves, hip and ridge details will be installed. The final step will be connecting the new tiles.

Ryan Tullis of Weathercraft Roofing is in charge of the project.

The library board has set a goal of raising \$14,270.00 for the tiles. Anyone interested in donating can purchase one tile for \$15.00. Donations can be

made in memory of a loved one and a plaque will be made to list those memorials.

Director Marcy Lucas, who came up with the idea of purchasing a tile as a fundraiser, said it is a way for people to take ownership of the building, which was included on the National Register of Historic Places in July of 2015 under the category of Late 19th and 20th Century Classical Revivals/Classical Revival/Neo-Classical Revival.

## Cost of Fireworks Display Goes Up 200 Percent

Donations needed to put on 4th of July Display

Gunther Fireworks owner Barb Gunther, who orders the public 4th of July display for Arnold, said last week that fireworks have gone up through the roof in the last couple of years, and help will be needed from the community to pay for the display.

In past years, a donation from the Sandhills Open Road Challenge had pretty much covered the cost, but this year's display will far exceed that amount.

Barb, who spends hours watching videos of fireworks to put together the entire show, said she recently received the new 2022 wholesale pricing from Hot Rocket Fireworks, saying that this year, at each point along the supply chain, the costs have continued to rise. Although the cost to manufacture the product has increased some, the main issue is that the freight cost from China has increased by over 200 percent in two years. The cost of the freight alone, to get a container of fireworks from China to the USA, is now relatively the same or higher than the cost of all the fireworks in the container

(a container of fireworks holds on average about 1,000 cases). This is all very frustrating for the wholesalers here in the U.S.A. because there is little that can be done to lower the freight cost.

At least 95 percent of Hot Rocket Fireworks are made in China, and they continue to add fees and surcharges for products that leave their ports. Lack of dockworkers, truck drivers and of course rising fuel costs here in the U.S.A. have also contributed to the issue.

Barb, who is passionate about fireworks and also orders them for the Callaway community's display, said her order has to be placed by May 5, and the bill will arrive in June. She is hoping, with the community's help, those costs will not have to come out of her own pocket.
