Arnold Fire Fighters Respond to 25 Calls Since January

A drought is persisting in our region, with 100 percent of Custer County categorized by the NIDIS (National Integrated Drought Information System) as D1 or moderate. Pasture and growth are stunted and surface water levels have declined.

Close to 60 percent of the county is in a severe drought. Crop yields are low and fires are increasing. Well levels are dropping, mandatory surface water irrigation restrictions are being implemented, and water use is high.

In an interview last Friday, September 9, Arnold Fire Department Chief Andrew Tickle commented that he wouldn't say for sure, but 2022 has to be right up there with 2012.

“With all the wind we got this spring, I would say it has been the windiest year I have seen in my short time on earth,” he said.

Fire calls are up quite a bit

over the past couple of years, with the department answering 25 since January, compared to 17 in all of 2021. Thankfully, they've been mainly mutual aid calls, when one of the department's mutual aid districts calls for help on a fire. The AVFD is part of three mutual aid districts that cover a lot of square miles of area, including Custer County Mutual, Sandhills Mutual, and Mid-Plains Mutual.

The largest fire the department has been a part of so far would be the 739 Fire down by Arapahoe/Elwood that burned around 35,000 acres.

“Going into the fall, who knows for sure, but the weather service in a couple of our meetings have told us to expect dry weather throughout the rest of the year and that we are in a La Niña. They didn't see anything kicking us out of it soon,” he said.

People should be really careful in the months ahead. Just last Thursday, 9-8-22, there was a red flag warning, which

means it is peak fire day. People are taking their cattle out of pastures and as harvest starts, Tickle would say people need to be extra cautious with how dry it is and all the dry fuel that is out there to burn.

“Our district has pretty much avoided fires thus far, and that's just how it worked out. Thankfully, we are a little bit better than Southwest Nebraska, but it is still not good. It wouldn't hurt to keep a tote of water around filled and ready if needed,” he said.

The Department is blessed to be one department and the fire and EMS are together. There are 25 members, and nine of them are EMT certified. Some firemen/firewomen have taken extra training classes for the fire and rescue side. The Department is always in need of help. It needs active fire/EMS department members that are willing show up and put in the time, day or night.

Tickle said, “I think some people may be shocked to know just how much time it takes up of a person's time in a given time, if they are active and show up to calls, meetings, training, and public events when available.

“I have always had the view of a volunteer department is that you volunteer to get on and then you show up if at all possible. That means sometimes our family and co-workers have to fill in and pick up the slack. I would like to thank them for that. With that being said, why do I do it? Personally, I like helping others and being there to help in time of need. I have always thought if I were in

need of help, I would want someone to be there for me. So why don't I do it, too? Plus, for some of us, it is just in our blood to do it. Volunteer departments are having a very hard time across all of Nebraska with getting/having active members on their departments. I also would like to thank the department members, their family, their employers and rural board publicly. Because without them, we wouldn't have the department we have.”

Village Board to Hold Budget Hearing Sept. 19

The Arnold Village Board of Trustees will hold a Budget Hearing on Monday, September 19, at 7:00 p.m. The proposed budget is \$2,602,280.00 for the 2022-2023 fiscal year.

Approximately 17 percent of the budgeted expenditures (\$440,000.00) are for electricity purchases from Municipal Energy Agency of Nebraska and Western Area Power Administration. Capital Improvement Expenditures include:
