## Attendance Down at Rialto In 2025

### Board members forced to increase prices

The Rialto Theatre started the new year off with a meeting of board members to discuss finances and updates to the building.

Members went over the financial report for 2025, revealing that the theater operated at a loss; both attendance and concession sales were down.

“Choosing movies was difficult last year, so we weren’t surprised that we had a loss, but we were surprised at how big of a loss it was,” Mary Becker said. “We just didn’t have a lot of choices of movies. We thought the movie buyer did a good job, considering what was out there. We usually get a couple of blockbusters a year, but that didn’t happen. We kept hoping that we would get a good movie towards the end of the year, and Zootopia 2 helped immensely, but it wasn’t enough. It was our first really big loss that we’ve had since taking over in 2017.”

One of the Rialto’s biggest source of revenue is money that comes in from movie sponsors, and it was discussed that the theater couldn’t operate without them. The three big costs are insurance, utilities, and paying a company for tech support. In 2026, the theater will be part of the downtown sidewalk project, and that will require a substantial amount of money for the match.

“We added two heat pumps over the years to keep the projector cool, which is critical, and adding the heat pump in the lobby has made all the difference in the world. We

have improved the theater for everyone – the volunteers and patrons – but it all comes at a cost,” said Becker.

Discussion was held on what to do going forward. The cost of concessions are going up, and those have been at the same price for 15 years. Board members have simply been putting off any kind of an increase, but all agreed that the time is now to bridge the gap. Members voted to increase candy prices by a \$1.00 from \$2.00 to \$3.00, and to increase ticket prices to the following:

Adults: from \$7.00 to \$8.00  
Children: from \$6.00 to \$7.00  
Seniors (Sunday only) from \$6.00 to \$7.00  
Popcorn and drinks will remain the same.

#### Updates

Updates to both the lobby and the meeting room continue. The lobby will get a refresh of new paint in neutral/gray colors. The meeting room, however, is getting a needed make-over, with new drywall and paint, flooring, crown molding, and the installation of a donated antique door. These updates started when it was noticed that the mortar on the brick wall was disintegrating.

“We’re trying to add a vintage feel back into the room,” said Becker.

Theater board members are Becker, Patty Lamberty, Rose Bierman, Cindy Urbanovsky, Heather Furne, Natalie Cool, and Debbie Connely. A handful of volunteers work the theatre ticket sales and concessions on rotation



### Ladies Are Chasing Their Goals

Eleven-year-old Paisley Brown has a passion for running that began almost as soon as she could walk. She ran her very first race at just three years old at the Lincoln County Fair, and hasn’t slowed down since. Blessed with a natural gift for running, the Arnold fifth grader runs nearly every day – whether it’s laps around the house, a sprint to the mailbox, or racing across the pasture to catch her horse.

Paisley has been a dedicated competitor in the Platte Valley Fitness Series in North Platte for the past eight years. During that time, she earned a Women’s 12-and-under-runner-up title once and has claimed the Overall Women’s 12-and-under championship for the past three consecutive years. Her racing experience also includes two marathon relays, a ruck, and three triathlons.

The Platte Valley Fitness Series has given this young runner the opportunity to run with what has become a family of runners – all with ties to Arnold – and all with different reasons of why they run.

Her grandmother, Liz Brown, has been competing in the series for the past 11 years. She strongly believes that keeping your body moving and running is vital to longevity, and her favorite thing is running with her grandkids. She completed every single race for the 2025 race season and says that the race series has built a strong sense of family and community for her. She will do her second half marathon at Mt. Rushmore this September. She is excited to spend her next chapter in life traveling and running.

Cheryl Mills Uhrmacher has ran her whole life. At A.H.S., she was a state qualifier in the sprints in the late 60s and early 70s. At around age 30, she continued to run for enjoyment. She used to travel to competitions, but now competes mainly once a year in Lincoln and North Platte. Cheryl says she’s slowed down with age, and now uses the walk/run method.

“Like many dedicated runners, Paisley has a love for good running shoes and is always on the lookout for her next favorite pair. Her big dream is to one day win a gold medal at the Nebraska State Track Meet when she reaches high school,” said her mom, Aubrey.
